AHS graduates forty-two

Forty-two young Atikokanites were awarded their Ontario Secondary School diplomas in ceremonies at Grayson Hall, Friday, June 22.

David Covello (an Ontario scholar with the class of 2001), now a successful accountant (he's a partner at MNP) and father (boys Colby, 3, and Logan, 1) shared a straightforward message of hope with the grads - complete with a PowerPoint presentation (but not a single spreadsheet).

He talked about "doing what he was supposed to do" after his graduation, and going off to Western University in London, Ontario.

"The whole time I was there I knew I was making a terrible mistake," he said. The whole time turned out to be two days.

He came back home to Atikokan and worked for a year and started to think more seriously about what happiness, and success in life, meant to him. A year later he was off to Lakehead University, and on the path that brought him to fatherhood and a professional career.

"It's up to you how you define your own success," he said. "It comes down to happiness."

"And if you find yourself unhappy, it's on you to find the way to change that.'

The other featured speaker of the evening was valedictorian Cole Kaus, who delivered a polished, sincere, and down-to-earth talk that must have made his classmates proud of their choice.

He focussed on the love and care he and his classmates have received from family, schools, and friends as they have grown and matured in this small town with its strong sense of community. He recalled many of the highlights of their schooling in Atikokan, from the hatching party at Hemlock School to Outers to the Voyageur sports teams.

"I know that without them all I would not be the man I am today," he said.
