#### **Highlights from the Year:**

Our School Council continues to feel that they can best support our students and families in the Community, Culture, and Caring Goal of the School Improvement Plan. The goal states, "If we work with students to develop their self-regulation skills then they will develop the confidence and resilience to work through challenging personal and academic challenges." The Council realized the importance of school involvement, student/teacher relationships, and school connectedness.

#### **Student Being Positive, Productive and Connected**

Council reviewed OurSchool survey results. Results showed a disconnect in students feeling connected to school, although they felt their teachers showed interest in and concern for them. The school promoted leadership activities through student-led clubs to foster a sense of belonging. Grade 3-6 students took a real interest and led Drawing, Soccer, and Singing clubs at recess. Staff supported them as mentors and supervisors. The school continued to promote student voice with regular visits to classrooms to get student feedback and with a student advisory group to discuss issues that arise and better ways for students to report bullying issues.

### **Christmas Shopping Event**

School Council once again assisted in the wrapping and tagging of gifts at our Christmas Shopping Event. Children shopped proudly for their families and were very excited to see the gifts be wrapped and tagged before bringing them home.

#### **PRO Grant**

School Council assisted with the PRO Grant Family Arts Night February 28. We were able to provide finger and brush painting, face painting, light tables, our graffiti mural, a puppet and Play Doh station, kinetic sand, rock painting, Legos and K'nex, solo cup station, giant Jenga and giant Connect 4, card making, and percussion instruments.

In addition, our community partners were ANFC Akwe Go program, Metis Nation of Ontario, Atikokan Public Library, Atikokan Museum, Brenda Hainey (yoga), Pictograph Gallery, Rainbow Centre, Sun Dog Toy Lending, KRRCFS, Family Health Team, Northwestern Health Unit, and local musicians and artists.

The grant money was spent on resources (\$1045.73) and refreshments (\$294.26). We received \$1103 from the PRO grant and the rest of the cost was covered through the school instructional supplies account.

The PRO committee required information from us regarding how we engage our parents. We accomplished the task of getting that information to them through an online survey, advertised on the website and in school newsletters.

### K-12 School

Parents on School Council were concerned and interested in the upcoming K-12 School being built in Atikokan. Meetings included updates as they were received from the Board.
