AHS - and Atikokan - celebrate 29 grads

Atikokan celebrated twenty-nine of its own June 23, the AHS 2017 graduating class.

Nearly half of the group, led by Governor General Academic Medal winner Reisha Vos, completed their final year with an eighty percent average in their top six classes, and earned Ontario Scholar designation. The group's outstanding achievements were rewarded by close to \$40,000 in scholarships, bursaries, and prizes. Vos led the way here too, becoming the first AHS student to win a Gaspard Canada 'Keep Canada Green' Scholarship; she won its top prize of \$2,500.

Eric Williams delivered a polished, warm, and light-hearted valedictory address, and Hannah Hayes prepared the now traditional slide show that evoked many fond memories.

Kerrilyn Huntley, a member of the 1996 class (and the 1994-95 Outers), made the address to the graduates.

She calls herself a "typical small town girl" who "still has roots in Atikokan".

"I wasn't the smartest kid, and I didn't like school much," she said. "But on the sports field, I gave it my all." She represented AHS at OFSAA in badminton, teaming with Rachel White - also a ringette teammate - to win NWOSSA and a provincial berth in doubles. She remains a keen othlete, playing baseball and hockey.

support that she was able to make it through in the face of a good deal of bullying.

Overcoming that adversity would eventually become a factor in her work life. She went on to college from AHS, studying first in health care and then in accounting, but finding no real place for herself in either field. A phone call one day about an apprenticeship opportunity changed her life.

She became a construction electrician with Hydro One, entering an apprenticeship program one of the first women to do so - at the age of 25. It was a five-year program that included three tenweek academic courses (she completed those at Confederation College), and 9,000 hours of handson work and training.

"I lived like a nomad for those years, following the job from city to city, sometimes even living out of my car," she said. "It isn't easy being a woman in a man's job, but the world is changing. And I am a very stubborn person - I wasn't going to quit."

"It was all worth it!"

Today, she is a supervisor with the giant utility (and was the first woman to be named a foreperson with Hydro One), and often speaks to new and aspiring apprentices on behalf of the company and
