December	Compassion (Empathy)	Teach "Empathy" with Grade Six Anti-Bullying Curriculum Page 38-40, Appendix pages 3-5. ***Idea - Response Journal #1: Pretend that you are Melea's classmate and you have just read her journal entry. January	Optimism	Teach "Optimism" through viewing "Pollyanna" – through the power of positive thinking, a young orphan girl is able to change the lives of an entire population of a small town OR "Mulan" – by staying true to herself, Mulan brings victory to her nation and honour to her family.
February	Honesty	We all know it's fine to talk about telling the truth all the time, but is it always the right thing to do? Is it always a good thing to do? Is it always necessary? What if the truth will hurt someone's feelings? This is a good subject for a discussion. Some people say it's OK to tell a little white lie if you're doing it so that feelings don't get hurt. Some people say it's never OK

		to lie, no matter what. 'Think of a situation where you told a little white lie. What was the reason? What did you learn about your character when it happened? **** Idea - It is very important at this time to discuss the rumor mill and gossiping. Students, girls especially, need to understand that just because they heard or saw something happen, they are not free to tell others. They must consider whether their telling will have a negative impact on others. So the "Susan, Jane told me that she thinks you are" should not be shared with Susan. Jane may very well have said something negative about Susan, but this information should not be shared with Susan because it will upset her. ** Idea - HONESTY can be demonstrated and acknowledged in many ways by adults, teens and children alike. Here is a true story about honesty that happened in a York Region public high school. A student approached his teacher and said, "I think my mark has been calculated incorrectly. It's 95 and I think it should be 85." The teacher said he doubted if he was off in his calculations by 10 points, but reviewed the mark with the student. Sure enough, the student's mark should have been 85. "Because I appreciate your honesty," the teacher said, "let's split the difference. We'll make it a 90." The student declined. "I earned 85 and that's what my mark should be." When that story was told around the Character Council meeting table, members were impressed by the depth of the student's honesty, especially in this highly competitive double cohort year when higher marks increase the odds of being accepted in university. Why don't you use this story as a discussion point with your family. Would you have been as honest as this student? How hard would it have been to be in this student's shoes?
